In the case when these both of these accounts are created for the same area (for example, the territory of the country,) this can be quite confused for users. Question 9. If we want to use SEEA EEA as a standard for future international comparisons, then countries need to understand which variables for which ecosystem types they should analyze. Thus, it would be useful to have recommended list of variables for different ecosystem types.
